The Utah Society Sons of the American Revolution gathered for its annual awards and recognition banquet on April 26, 2014 at the West Valley Centennial Park, West Valley City, UT. Those who attended enjoyed a great meal, fabulous entertainment, and were educated on the lives of several American Revolutionaries whose images survive today.

The evening was called to order by President E. Layton Patterson, and the invocation was offered by Chaplain Paul L. Child, Sr. The UTSSAR Color Guard presented the colors; Bill Simpson led the Pledge of Allegiance, and everyone joined in singing the first and fourth verses of our National Anthem. Trenton G. Grandy led the reciting of The American's Creed.

Landon has also received numerous awards and recognition for his musical talents, which he shared with us as

he played the piano and sang several musical numbers.

The JROTC State Medal was awarded to **Dakota Fiske**, who was unable to attend due to a conflict with a JROTC activity.

Our guest speaker this year, Joseph M. Bauman, Jr., author of the e-book, <u>Don't Tread on Me:</u> <u>Photographs and Life Stories of</u> <u>American Revolutionaries</u>, he shared with us some of the stories from his book and the daguerreotype images he's collected of several veterans of our war for independence. Daguerreotype photography (daguerreotype) was introduced in 1839, 50 years after the end of the American Revolution, by



which time, many of those who fought for independence were no longer living. So it was quite remarkable for Mr. Bauman to have in his possession six of these images to share with us.

As a part of our meeting a new member to the UTSSAR was sworn in and presented with their rosettes. Robert Gunderson is

Meet Our New UTSSAR President - Regan G. Grandy

Regan G. Grandy was born in Teton Valley, Idaho but gradu-

ated from high school in Alaska after a family move. He's had the opportunity to complete two different internships for a U.S. Senator on Capitol Hill. His college studies began at Ricks College, Rexburg, Idaho and were interrupted by a twoyear mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, serving in Oakland, California. At Ricks he completed an Associates' of Arts



and Science degree in Natural Science. After his marriage to his wife, Amy, they moved to Pocatello, Idaho where he completed three degrees: Bachelors of Science in Secondary Education; Masters of Natural Science in Geology; and Doctorate in Educational Leadership. During this time, he and his wife were blessed with two sons: Cameron and Kaledon.

With his education behind him, Regan began working for the Pocatello School District as a grant writer, but after three years he was enticed to move to Logan, Utah to work for a private company as a grant evaluator. In this position he has travelled the U.S. extensively in helping school districts implement grantfunded programs. He says his "job is in helping school districts



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collect, analyze, report on and improve educational programs."

Regan's interest in joining the Sons of the American Revolution began as a result of one of his trips to New York, where by "an absolute miracle, [he] located a branch of [his] maternal line, and was impressed to hear that one of them had been associated with the color guard of the Empire State Sons of the American Revolution." After doing some research, he discovered that there was a Sons of the American Revolution in Utah **AND** that the UTSSAR had a color guard, which sealed the deal for him to ultimately seek membership. He says that he is honored to be "considered amongst the ranks of fine patriots, such as yourselves."

Besides being an active member of the UTSSAR Color Guard, President Grandy has served as 2nd Vice President and is currently working with other members of the board to revise and update the state's website. We look forward to his leadership over this next year.

On April 19, 2014 the UTSSAR Color Guard, Regiment 1776, and the Utah Long Rifle Association were at Fort Buenaventura, located west of downtown Ogden, UT, for an event to commemorate the "Shot Heard Around the World", where they also



participated in the presentation of the colors and a flag ceremony. The column of soldiers with the color guard paused as they marched around the

lake, they fired one volley from their muskets and continued on over a scenic bridge on their journey to the old fort. Along the way another volley was fired by the Utah Long Rifle Association as they drew near the fort. Color guard member and 1st VP,

Douglas McGregor, spoke to those who had gathered for the event to explain the significance of April 19th with these words.

"Paul Revere and others rode through the night calling out The British are coming! the British are coming!" to warn the people to prepare. On this day on April 19, 1775 the farmers and settlers of Lexington faced the British army on the village green. The odds were 10 to 1, but the brave farmers stood



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their ground. The British major ordered the patriots to disburse. After a moment's hesitation, a shot was fired. A cloud of musket smoke soon covered the field. When the brief battle was over, eight Americans were dead and ten were wounded. The British then marched on to Concord, but this time hundreds of armed

patriots were waiting, and the British were driven back to Boston. The Battles of Lexington and Concord were the first battles of the American Revolution. After



cover the significance of liberty and freedom through reenactments of prominent Founding Fathers. They'll meet Pilgrim Forefather William Bradford and family; Reverend Muhlenberg, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, Alexander Hamilton, John Jay, and the Father of our Country, George Washington. They'll also participate in fun and inspiring activities, stretching over two days, that teach the values of Private Virtue, Public Virtue, and the Founders' Controls to Preserve Liberty.

An exciting evening is planned with special guest speakers, including a WWII Veteran, and musical entertainment.

On Saturday morning, the UTSSAR and Venturing Crew— Regiment 1776—are scheduled to present a flag ceremony wearing exact replica Continental Hunting Frock and Regulars' uniforms, with drums and fife, cannon, and flintlock muskets from the American Revolutionary War.

Members of the Trapper Trails Council are very excited to be the first BSA council in Utah to have their scouts experience the Liberty Trek. Organizers of Liberty Trek are very hopeful that, with success, other BSA councils in Utah will want to have their scouts experience the Liberty Trek. Liberty Trek for the Trapper Trails Council will be held September 5-6 at Fort Buenaventura in Ogden, Utah. As many as 3,000 scouts are expected to attend. The Utah Society Board of Managers is asking for volunteers to help do the preparation work for the activities the scouts will participate: help support the UTSSAR recruitment booth; to help with the food serving and cleaning, help with care and comfort of the actors portraying the Founding Fathers and many other service opportunities.
