Celebrate America - Awards and Recognition Program

Saturday May 16 brought together an extraordinary group of people to be recognized and honored for their devotion to liberty and love of country.

After a delicious meal catered by Majestic Grill, the audience was introduced to a few



very distinguished people: **Utah Regent Mrs. Judy D. Barkling** received the **SAR Medal of Appreciation**

and shared an uplifting message concerning the DAR and liberty.

Mrs. Amy Grandy received the **Martha Washington Medal** for her consistent and significant support of the State society's programs.



Kaledon G. Grandy received the **Outstanding Citizenship Pin** for his consistently obtaining a 4.0 GPA, being on the honor role, and conceiving, directing, filming and creating the 2014 Shot Heard Round the World color guard promotional video.



Cadet Major Rosalyn Carlisi was recognized for being the winner of the **State JROTC Medal**; she also was chosen by National SAR as the first place winner of the National JROTC

contest.

Paul L. Child Sr., who has coordinated the Utah SAR Eagle Scout contest for many years, introduced



and awarded **Addison Weeks** the **State Eagle Scout** trophy and scholarship. Addison earned all of the BSA merit badges, and placed fifth in the National Eagle Scout Contest.

Weber County Sheriff Terry L. Thompson, who won his second term in office unopposed,



was awarded the **State Law Enforcement Commendation Medal**. He has twenty-five years in law enforcement, having served in virtually every position within the Sheriff's department and is a strong proponent of unalienable rights and liberty.

The audience listened as the Sheriff shared his inspiring remarks concerning the Constitution, duty and honor.

This year the Board of Managers determined that **Mrs. Kathryn Ann Smith** should receive the **Silver Good Citizenship Medal**. An impressive list of accomplishments was read to the audience, which demonstrated Mrs. Smith's many years of patriotic service to the State of Utah and her community. Everyone was then favored with an incredible presentation from **Farley M. Anderson** who portrayed himself as Benjamin Franklin.



"Franklin" told the story of the miraculous creation of fifteen paintings, beautiful and impressive works of art that told the story of significant miracles that occurred during the Revolutionary War.

"Franklin's" message was God is the author of our liberty and freedom, God preserved and protected the Revolutionary War patriots and brought about America's independence. For liberty and freedom to live, each of us must do our part to protect and defend the great gift Providence has given us.

The **Bronze Good Citizenship Medal** began in 1895 and recognizes persons whose achievements are noteworthy in their school, community or state. Recipient's were **Regan G. Grandy** for volunteer service to the Cub Scout program and Bear River Health Department, representing Cache and Rich Counties, to help them understand what a community can do to achieve drug free communities; **Bill Simpson** for twenty years of service as an outstanding teacher of Business Computer Technology for middle and high schools, adult education and junior colleges; and **Trenton C. 

Washington Remembered!

On March 20, 2015 The Utah SAR, in partnership with the Utah DAR and the Constitution Day Committee of Utah held a celebration of George Washington's Birthday and commemorated the 240th year since the beginning of the Revolutionary War. Gerald Hasty, CDC of UT Treasurer, offered the invocation, the Utah SAR color guard presented the colors and the audience sang My Country Tis of Thee, accompanied by Judy Barking, Utah DAR Regent. Bill Simpson, Utah SAR Historian, led the audience in saying the American's Creed.

Utah Society President Regan Grandy, Utah DAR Regent Judy Barking, and Gerald Hasty offered greetings and brief remarks. Vickie Fuller, representing the DAR, offered a beautiful prayer blessing the food. The delicious dinner, catered by Ma-

jestic Grill, featured hand-rubbed, seasoned' smoked pot roast and grilled chicken breasts marinated in Majestic Grill's secret sauce. Talk about finger lick'n good! The desert featured home-made cakes that were moist and scrumptious with ice cream!

After the dinner, the audience was treated to a foot stomping, hand clapping performance of music performed by the Utah Old Time Fiddlers: Doug Anderson, Darrell Rector, Ted and Sandy Shupe, Lexie Stoker, Mark and Helen Watts, A.J. Wright (13-yr old boy) and Becky Wright (A.J.'s aunt). The audience was delighted to hear the sounds of harmonica, fiddle, guitar, base, and other "old time" musical instruments playing tunes or the singing of ballads. A sample of their performance included: Redwing, Golden Slippers, Whoa Ha Buck and Jerry Boy, Wreck of the Old 97, Ashokan Farewell and Orange Blossom Special.

Following the Old Time Fiddlers, the audience stood and welcomed His Excellency General George Washington.

Washington was portrayed by Gary VanDolzer, an accomplished actor and performer. VanDolzer, with the exception of shoe size, is nearly identical to Washington in height, weight, and size. His uniform, a replica of Washington's uniform, on display at the Smithsonian, and his clear and distinctive voice caused many to think that the Father of our Country was actually speaking to them. Among his remarks, "Washington" said,

"Having liberty requires courage, it requires fortitude and vigilance in remembering and doing. Remember who you are---not hyphenated Americans, not members loyal to any political party nor to any man's whims, but to the principles and the ideals that have created and sustained this miracle we call America. Remember, as John Adams said, that: "Our Constitution was made only for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other." And Adams colleague when the Declaration of Independence was signed, Dr. Benjamin Rush, reminds us, "The only foundation for... a republic is to be laid in Religion. Without this there can be no virtue, and without virtue there can be no liberty, and liberty is the object and life of all republican governments." The American people cannot compro-

mise on morality and virtue and expect long to be free, for men will be governed by God or by tyrants; there is no other choice! Remember that the gift of liberty comes with a price. It continues only so long as those blessed by liberty do the simple things liberty requires. And you can believe that God will not abandon those who uphold liberty! Liberty will live; believe in America and in yourself."

VanDolzer received a standing ovation from all in attendance. After his performance, those in attendance were invited to have a picture taken with General Washington, standing in front of a back drop of Revolutionary War flags. One compatriot who has been coming to the UTSSAR's patriotic events for many years remarked, "Of all the years I have been a member, and all the programs I've attended, this one was clearly the best!"

Students Learn From The American Revolution

The night before, the school stage was decorated with twelve flags of the American Revolution. At 8:00 a.m. Friday, March 20th, over 800 Marriott-Slaterville, Utah, Venture Academy students from kindergarten to the eighth grade filled the auditorium. Drum and fife music greeted them as they took their seats.



Brett McAllister and Brett Cragun, the school's history and social studies teachers, welcomed the students and their teachers, and introduced, from the Utah SAR, Lyle Gingery and Doug McGregor dressed in Continental Army uniforms. The students said the Pledge of Allegiance and then participated in a dramatic presentation that explained events leading to the "Shot Heard Round the World." Students heard the stirring words of Patrick Henry, concluding with his immortal words, "Give me liberty or give me death!"

Eight students stood and faced the filled auditorium and were told, "Imagine you are the farmers on the village green at Lexington; you are outnumbered ten to one by the British Army. Would you be afraid? Would you have the courage to stand for liberty?" A distinctive "ahhh" filled the auditorium as the girls and boys realized the farmers' situation. Students learned about the Battle of Bunker Hill, Washington's commission as Commander-in-Chief, and were told of the meaning of the flags that stood proudly on the school stage.



The assembly ended with the students and their teachers singing a patriotic song. Afterwards, several of the students came on stage to thank the presenters and share their positive feelings about the program.

Gregg Hansen, Regan Grandy, Trent Grandy and Doug McGregor were in attendance. Regan Grandy, in his role as President of the Utah Society SAR remained for dinner and offered remarks. This was a very special year for the Utah DAR, as they were celebrating the 125th anniversary of the DAR's founding. Attending as their special guest was DAR President General Lynn Young, who shared the many exciting developments occurring within the DAR. PG Young congratulated the Utah DAR for participating in an impressive 44 naturalization ceremonies last year.



One of the meetings highlights was the presentation of the DAR Americanism Award to Mr. James Poon. James was born in Vietnam. As the Vietnam war progressed and the family's situation grew more precarious, his family moved to Laos to escape the Communist takeover. He worked for a newspaper until the Communists invaded Laos. James told his family he could not live where there was no freedom. He left his home and lived three years in Thailand in a refugee camp. Eventually he was able to find a way to America, where he has spent many years helping refugees to assimilate and become Americans. After accepting his award, he told the audience what a privilege it is to have freedom, and how grateful he was to be living in America.
