

What Is Liberty?

We hear this word often, but what does Liberty mean? How is it different from the word Freedom? Why are the words Liberty and Freedom so important to an American? We will travel back to the era of the Founding Fathers to review their understanding of these two words. To help us, we will rely on the works of Noah Webster. Webster is remembered as the "Father of American Scholarship and Education". He was born on October 16, 1758, in West Hartford, Connecticut. He was married to Rebecca Greenleaf. He graduated from Yale in 1778 and served in the Connecticut Militia during the Revolutionary War. Webster helped edit the Federalist Papers published in New York's first daily newspaper that he founded, the American Minerva. In 1806, Webster published his first dictionary, A Compendious Dictionary of the English Language. He died May 28, 1843, in New Haven, Connecticut.



Noah Webster's 1828 publication, An American Dictionary of the English Language, is an important work for many modern readers because it is contemporary with the American Constitution. As a reference tool it is invaluable to anyone studying the national documents and literature of the period. It will help the reader understand the meaning of words that may have changed with the passage of time.

The 1828 Webster's Dictionary defines Liberty as follows:

LIB'ERTY, noun [Latin libertas, from liber, free.]

- Freedom from restraint, in a general sense, and applicable to the body, or to the will or mind. The
 body is at liberty when not confined; the will or mind is at liberty when not checked or controlled.
 A man enjoys liberty when no physical force operates to restrain his actions or volitions.
- Natural liberty consists in the power of acting as one thinks fit, without any restraint or control,
 except from the laws of nature. It is a state of exemption from the control of others, and from
 positive laws and the institutions of social life. This liberty is abridged by the establishment of government.
- 3. <u>Civil liberty</u> is the liberty of men in a state of society, or natural liberty so far only abridged and restrained, as is necessary and expedient for the safety and interest of the society, state or nation. A restraint of natural liberty not necessary or expedient for the public, is tyranny or oppression. Civil liberty is an exemption from the arbitrary will of others, which exemption is secured by established laws, which restrain every man from injuring or controlling another. Hence the restraints of law are essential to civil liberty.
 - The liberty of one depends not so much on the removal of all restraint from him, as on the due

restraint upon the liberty of others.

- In this sentence, the latter word liberty denotes natural liberty.
- 4. <u>Political liberty</u> is sometimes used as synonymous with civil liberty, but it more properly designates the liberty of a nation, the freedom of a nation or state from all unjust abridgment of its rights and independence by another nation. Hence, we often speak of the political liberties of Europe, or the nations of Europe.
- Religious liberty is the free right of adopting and enjoying opinions on religious subjects, and of worshiping the Supreme Being according to the dictates of conscience, without external control.
- Liberty in metaphysics, as opposed to necessity, is the power
 of an agent to do or forbear any particular action, according
 to the determination or thought of the mind, by which either is
 preferred to the other.
 - Freedom of the will; exemption from compulsion or restraint in willing or volition.
- Privilege; exemption; immunity enjoyed by prescription or by grant; with a plural. Thus, we speak of the liberties of the commercial cities of Europe.
- 8. Leave; permission granted. The witness obtained liberty to leave the court.
- A space in which one is permitted to pass without restraint, and beyond which he may not lawfully pass; with a plural; as the liberties of a prison.
- Freedom of action or speech beyond the ordinary bounds of civility or decorum. Females should repel all improper liberties.
 - To take the liberty to do or say anything, to use freedom not specially granted.
 - To set at liberty to deliver from confinement; to release from restraint.
 - To be at liberty, to be free from restraint.
 - <u>Liberty of the press</u>, is freedom from any restriction on the power to publish books; the free power of publishing what one pleases, subject only to punishment for abusing the privilege, or publishing what is mischievous to the public or injurious to individuals.
 - First occurrence in the Bible (KJV): Leviticus 25:10 [underlining provided for emphasis]

Webster defines Freedom as follows:

FREE'DOM, noun

A state of exemption
from the power or control of another; liberty; exemption from

- slavery, servitude or confinement. freedom is personal, civil, political, and religious. [See Liberty.]
- Particular privileges; franchise; immunity; as the freedom of a city.
- 3. Power of enjoying franchises.
- Exemption from fate, necessity, or any constraint in consequence of predetermination or otherwise; as the <u>freedom of the will</u>.
- 5. Any exemption from constraint or control.
- Ease or facility of doing anything. He speaks or acts with freedom.
- 7. Frankness; boldness. He addressed his audience with freedom.
- 8. License; improper familiarity; violation of the rules of decorum; with a plural. Beware of what are called innocent freedoms. [underlining provided for emphasis]

The first thing we notice is the difference in the length of definitions. Liberty's 1828 definition uses 559 words while Freedom's definition uses 116 words. We learn that, in one sense, liberty and freedom are synonymous with each other and, in other ways, they are different.

Freedom to choose, to have moral agency, is a freedom paramount to all Americans. It is the freedom the patriots of the American Revolution risked their lives for. The patriot's wanted the freedom to own property, the freedom to keep and bear arms, to live in a land free from fear, and to be free to exercise what they believed to be their other God given unalienable rights. Liberty was perhaps the most important of these natural rights. Patrick Henry's speech in March 1775, ended with the words, "Give Me Liberty or Give Me Death!". These words became a powerful motto of the American Revolution.

Henry of course was referring to Natural, Civil, Political, and Religious Liberties; the type of liberty the patriots were literally willing to die for. Its vital that we as Americans have a deep understanding



of what Freedom and Liberty are, why they are important and why they truly are worth fighting and dying for.

The Road to Independence 1773 - 250 Years Ago

The year 1773 brought about some of the most significant events to flame rebellion against the British Crown. The colonists are moving ever closer to thoughts of independence!

January 6th: Felix, an African colonial slave, petitions the Massachusetts governor Thomas Hutchinson for the abolition or relaxation of slavery.

March: The Virginian assembly sets up its own 11-man Committee of Correspondence; four other colonies soon follow suit.

April 22nd: The New-York Gazetteer begins publication. The Gaz-

etteer was published by James Rivington, one of the most accomplished printers in America at that time. Throughout the American Revolution, the loyalist Gazetteer contained the most foreign news of any newspaper in America, thus, becoming a major source of information for both patriot and loyalist.

May 10th: The Tea Act is passed (without colonist representation). This is an attempt by Parliament to undercut smugglers by reducing the price of tea to the colonies. The

Act permits the British East India Company to sell surplus tea directly to American retailers. American colonists resented what they saw as an indirect tax subsidizing a British company.

July: Publication of Thomas Hutchinson letters. In these letters, Hutchinson, the Massachusetts governor, advocated a 'great re-



straint of natural liberty', convincing many colonists of a planned British clamp-down on their freedoms.

September: Opposition to the terms of the **Tea Act** grows in the colonies, particularly in Boston and New York City.

November: Three tea-laden British ships arrive in Boston Harbor but are prevented from offloading their cargo by locals.

December 15th: [Five] Resolves of the New York Sons of Liberty – "The following associ-

ation is signed by a great number of the principal gentlemen of the city, merchants, lawyers, and other inhabitants of all ranks, and it is still carried about the city, to give an opportunity to those who have not yet signed to unite with their fellow-citizens, to testify their abhorrence to the diabolical project of enslaving America." The Resolves are published on this day by the Association of the Sons of Liberty in New York.



December 16th: Boston Tea Party. Angered by the Tea Act, a small band of American patriots, disguised as Mohawk Indians, dump 342 crates of tea worth £9,000 of East India Company property into the Boston harbor. When Parliament learns of this, a decisive retaliatory response will be forthcoming!

Remembering America's Most Indispensable Man

The Utah Society hosted a banquet on February 18th featuring General George Washington (aka Gary VanDolzer – Utah SAR Associate). Washington stood at a podium on the stage of the Sons of the Utah Pioneers banquet hall in full Revolutionary War military uniform (VanDolzer's uniform is an exact replica of Washington's uniform, on display in the Smithsonian). VanDolzer, who is a professional actor, voice over, and presenter, addressed those in attend-

ance as General Washington. Here are a few excerpts from his powerful speech:

"What a miracle America is! Here on this continent has arisen a beacon to the world, with American ideals that declare men are free to worship as they please, to live their vision of prosperity, to dream for their children, and to hope for more for themselves. Here in this land stands the light on a hill, to bring the troubled and the dispossessed the singular chance to transform not only themselves but,

through new ideas and thoughts, to make a brighter future for all who live or will follow . . .

With victory and independence ours at last, for you, our posterity, we forged a new government, the Constitution, a Heavenly Banner, and...a covenant, between a people and their representative government, declaring that your unalienable rights are the gift of God and not of any man, and thus no government, no agency, no man has the authority to take those rights from you! . . .

Whatever may be the judgment pronounced on the competency of the architects of the Constitution, or whatever may be the destiny of the edifice prepared by them, I feel it a duty to express, with James Madison, my profound and solemn conviction... . that there never was an assembly of men, charged with so great and arduous a trust, who were more pure in their motives, or more exclusively or anxiously devoted to the object committed to them. . .

Remember liberty's price. A free people cannot compromise morality and virtue and expect long to keep their freedom, for men will be governed by God or by tyrants; there is no other choice! Remember that the gift of liberty comes with this price. It continues only so long as those blessed with freedom do the simple things liberty requires . . . And you can believe that God will not abandon those who uphold liberty. Liberty will live; believe in America and in yourself. Believe in what you can do to preserve the miracle we call freedom!"

Before the banquet, a new member induction ceremony occurred. The banquet was opened by Utah SAR President Trenton Grandy. Chaplain Wade Alexander gave the invocation, followed by the Utah SAR Color Guard providing the flag ceremony. DAR Honorary State Regent, Kathryn Asay, acted as chorister for the singing of the National Anthem, and Compatriot Raymond Brown led the audience in reciting the American's Creed. Greetings were given by President Grandy, Intermountain Vice President General Ellis Rail, and Utah State DAR Regent Katie Madsen.

Dinner grace was given by JaLaine Lowe, DAR Spirit of America Chapter Regent; a delicious colonial themed dinner was provided by Majestic Grill. Awards were presented to Jackie Elliott – the SAR Daughters of Liberty Medal, and Dana Grandy was awarded a SAR Certificate of Appreciation. The audience enjoyed the fiddle music of Mark and Helen Watts. Those attending felt rewarded and commented on how much they enjoyed the evening.

America's 250th Anniversary Utah SAR Committee Update

The Utah SAR 250 Committee convened on June 21st to complete organization and hear a report from 250 Committee Chairman Douglas McGregor, who was appointed by Utah Governor Cox to serve on the Utah America 250 Commission. There are 21 Commissioners the Governor selected, representing geographical areas, as well as various sectors of Utah (e.g. business, education,

military, government, etc.). LaDawn Stoddard is the Commission

Chair. The Governor was the opening speaker. He told the group that he had selected the names for the 250 Commission. He shared the three National 250 Focus Areas: Education, Engagement and Unity. The Governor commented on the fact the Commission was organizing and meeting on June 6th – the 79th anniversary of D-Day. He spoke of bravery and devo-



tion to freedom. He commented on some of the people who were serving as commissioners: Mindy Benson, President of SUU, Christine Durham an attorney and former Chief Justice of the Utah Supreme Court, Ron Fox educator and historian. He also expressed his appreciation for having Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution accepting his invitation to serve on the commission. He challenged the commission to, "Think big and be bold."

The Utah SAR 250th Committee completed its organization tasks, accepting Trenton Grandy as Co-Chair and Regan Grandy as Secretary. A representative from the Red Cliffs of Zion Chapter was added to the committee: Frank Gagliardi. After reviewing the notes from the Utah 250 Commission meeting and a letter from Ron Fox, the Utah SAR 250 Committee held a brainstorming session to consider ideas for the 250th celebration. Committee members were invited to talk with other members, share the committee's objectives, and ask for additional ideas before the next meeting. The committee agreed to have their meetings following the commission meetings so that timely feedback and participation could be achieved.



20 years prior to the beginning of the American Revolution. He told those in the audience who were Sons or Daughters of the American Revolution, chances are they would not have been born in America. "If our ancestors had not been executed for treason, they most likely would have been banished to

Australia, South Africa or some other distant place in the British Empire."

The Judge spoke of American born scientists, inventors, educators, statesmen, and others who traced their linage to Revolutionary War patriots and their contributions to the world. In all practicality these individuals would not have risen to greatness in a British controlled land due to the British class system. The blue bloods of Great Britain who were not first-born sons would have been given large tracks of land in America and



the colonists would have lived as sharecroppers or "commoners" under British rule.

The eight yearlong Revolutionary War, won by our patriot ancestors, gave the world a "light upon a hill", an example of Constitutional Republicanism, freedom, self-governance, and the importance of inalienable God given rights. Many nations were influenced by America and made changes for the betterment of humanity, even Great Britain was positively influenced by the United States. America's influence brought world changes to slavery, woman's suffrage, and other important civil rights. Our patriot ancestor's victory over tyranny and oppression secured a land of liberty and brought about freedoms not had in the world before.

After his remarks, the Judge was presented by President Grandy with an SAR collector's challenge coin having the motto of Washington's Life Guard's "Conquer or Die". The Utah SAR Board of Managers are unanimous in highly recommending the Judges book and encourage all members and associates to purchase a copy and read it. It would be an excellent book for anyone adversely affected by negativity toward America. Having read it, there is no question the world is a better place and better off to have a sovereign, free, and strong United States of America!

Passing of Stan Ellsworth American Ride KBYU TV

April 15,2024 saw the funeral of a beloved and great patriot — Stan Ellsworth age 63. Stan was a great friend to the Utah SAR and a great friend to America. He was the star of the Emmy Award Winning KBYU TV show American Ride and the author of the book, Renegades and Rebels: Epic & True Stories of our Revolutionary Heroes.

"Born in Salt Lake City, Utah, and raised in the Carolinas, Virginia,

and Pennsylvania, Stan Ellsworth grew up with the stories of American history. His family lineage includes such historic luminaries as Revolutionary War patriot Ethan Allen, Robert E. Lee, Ulysses S. Grant, Daniel Boone, and Davy Crockett. Stan earned a bachelor's degree in history,

played and coached football, and then became a high school history teacher. When he was approached by a film producer, he turned his attention to acting. But he found that his love for history and teaching young people still called to him. In combining those

passions, along with riding his Harley, Stan Ellsworth found his dream job in American Ride." (Amazon Editorial Review)

In his TV show Stan rode his motorcycle taking the audience to notable places in American history. His series on the American Revolution was very well done and in gratitude he was awarded the SAR Sil-

ver Good Citizenship Medal on September 17, 2013. (See the story at the UtahSocietySAR.org website. In the menu, go to "News". Open the Utah Patriot Newsletter - Fall 2013 issue)

You can see him proudly wearing the SAR medal in a few episodes. On one filming day it blew off his jacket unnoticed and was lost! The Utah SAR graciously replaced it for him. He did not wear the second one on his jacket while riding his motorcycle!

The SAR's three-fold mission to support Education, History, and Patriotism is our mission. Your elected officers of the chapter want to thank each and every one of



you who volunteer to give service. Thank you! The following are some of the major activities recently supported by our chapter:

Wreaths Across America

The RCofZ color guard participated in the laying of wreaths on the graves of Veterans at the Tonaquint Cemetery. There were approximately 500 people in attendance supporting the December 2022 program.

Red, White, and Blue Dinner

The Red, White, and Blue Dinner and auction was held on February 24th. The chapter combined with the local DAR chapter and the CAR to hold a fund-raising dinner. Funds raised exceeded the event's goals.

Utah Cold War Medal

The Red Cliffs of Zion, Utah SAR Chapter, in conjunction with the Utah Cold War Medal Society, was honored to have presented the Utah Cold War Victory Medal to 18 of our local residents on Wednesday, March 22nd at 7:00pm. Several of the recipients are members of our Utah SAR chapter. The ceremony was held at the Old Tabernacle at the corner of Tabernacle and Main Streets in downtown St. George.

The purpose of this event was to recognize our Cold War Veterans. These are Veterans who served in any of the Armed Services of the

United States during the "Cold War period". The Cold War Victory Medal was approved by Congress in 2001 and is presented to Veterans who served between 1945-1991.

The program began with a prayer by Red Cliffs of Zion Chapter Chaplain John Choate, followed by a welcome by Master of Ceremony, Compatriot Mark Woodbury, who thanked the Veterans for their service as well as thanking all who made the evening possible. Mark also described who the Sons of the American Revolution are and stated the SAR goals.



The Dixie High School JROTC, along with two members of the Red Cliffs of Zion Chapter Color Guard, provided the presentation of the Colors and led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The opening song "My America" was then performed by the Lava Ridge Middle School 30-member Honor Choir, led by Director Caroline Harris. Mark Woodbury, who is not a Veteran, gave a poignant brief talk titled "My perspective, From the Outside Looking In." He then introduced the keynote speaker, Lieutenant Colonel Frank Gagliardi USMC (Ret), who serves as Vice President of the Red Cliffs of Zion Chapter. Frank served in both the Enlisted and

Officer ranks in the United States Marine Corps from 1968-1991. He spoke on "From the Inside, What is a Veteran". The program was then turned over to Marti Bigbi, Secretary, Utah Cold War Veterans Foundation, for presentation of the Utah Cold War Victory Medal and Certificate to 26 very deserving Veterans.

These Veterans represented each of the Armed Services in a variety of ranks but never received recognition for their service until now. This event was very well attended by over 200 family members and friends, in addition to members of the community who wanted to show their support for these Patriots.

The Lava Ridge Middle School Honor Choir sang the closing song, "We Remember", which was followed by the closing prayer by Red Cliffs of Zion Chapter member Herb Cihak. Mark Woodbury then thanked everyone for attending and again congratulated the Veterans.

This charitable organization is leading the fundraising activities for Liberty Village, being built in Hurricane, Utah. UWP is a self-funded organization that promotes patriotism and liberty education for American families, youth, and foreigners.

The three-fold purpose of UWP is Education, Celebration, and Destination. Under the Education goal, over 5,000 families have downloaded free American History lessons; and, Liberty Live is being taken to 5th grade classrooms where the teaching of America's founding values is permitted.

Under the goal of Celebration, UWP has worked with the Washington County Board of Commissioners to have celebrations honoring the Fourth of July, Constitution Week, and Veterans Day.

Finally, under the goal of Destination, UWP is in the process of constructing Liberty Village which is a 60-million-dollar project covering 40 acres, that will depict buildings and events that led to the formation of the United States. The first phase of this project is scheduled for completion by September 2024 with the final phase of Liberty Village scheduled for July 4, 2026, just in time to celebrate the 250th birthday of America!

CAR Project Receives Support

Children of the American Revolution (CAR) Junior President GraceAnn Christiansen reported on her project for this year to the mem-

bers of the RCofZ chapter. She is working toward raising \$1,000 and awareness for the Veterans Memorial to be erected in the Ivins City Cemetery. During her presentation, the Chapter Tri-corn hat was passed, wherein \$270 was collected for her project.



TICONDEROGA - LIBERTY MONUMENT

Liberty Monument is a historic monument located at Ticonderoga in Essex County, New York. It was built in 1924 and is a bronze sculpture on a tiered granite base. The lower part of the sculpture is composed of four life-sized figures of a Native American, a Frenchman, a Scottish soldier, and an American. They symbolize the four groups whose military exploits are part of Ticonderoga's past. The second part is the artist Charles Keck's (1875–1951) interpretation of Liberty.
