Utah's Campaigns for Freedom

Utah is blessed to have many patriotic minded citizens, people who are concerned that our youth, and their families, understand the principles that enable the preservation of liberty and freedom. How many of Utah's patriotic educational programs have you or your family attended? Most of these programs are free or charge a small nominal fee.

Did you know Utah County has the Freedom Festival, held annually, in correlation with the 4th of July? In Bountiful, Freedom's Light holds a program each year at the Bountiful City Park around Constitution Day in September. The Constitution Day Committee of Utah hosts a Constitution Educational program, typically in the Davis County area, around September 17th. During the months of June, July and August, the Utah Patriot Camp organization provides patriotic education to 1st through 6th graders in eight different locations in the state. The Utah SAR, partnering with the Constitution Day Committee of Utah and the Trapper Trails Council BSA, provides Liberty Trek every other year at Fort Buenaventura in Ogden.

There are undoubtedly other organizations whose programs occur within Utah, but those listed here are events for which the Utah SAR has, in the past, provided volunteers and/or support. This issue will highlight these patriotic, educational programs, and help you understand what they offer and why they are of value.

The Utah Society Sons of the American Revolution receives annual invitations to help support these programs, and bring our enthusiasm for essential Revolutionary War history and patriotism to assist in their operations. Everything from volunteering to help with lunch, assisting with security, helping to teach, or present, or perform color guard activities are opportunities for those who have an interest in giving patriotic service.

Perhaps your situation, due to job constraints or current life circumstance limitations, hold you

back from stepping forward to give of your time and talents. Please know that, in addition to paying your annual membership dues, you can give an additional monetary donation, requesting that it be used for patriotic educational purposes.

We invite you to take some time this next year and bring your family to participate in one or more of these activities. Rejuvenating ourselves and our posterity in the principles of liberty and freedom is certainly the right thing to do.

Stadium of Fire Calls Again

The Utah SAR Color Guard was contacted by the Stadium of Fire organization to provide color guard service for their 2016 Freedom Extravaganza. This year the main performance was provided by country western singer Tim McGraw. Hundreds of dancers, choirs, parachute jumpers and a spectacular fireworks show highlighted the evening. The Utah SAR color guard led a group of 15 color guard groups into the stadium, with the Joint Armed Services color guard coming in to stand at the front for the National Anthem.

All those participating in the color guard received free program tickets for themselves and their immediate families. Held in the LaVell Edwards Stadium on Brigham Young University Campus, Provo, Utah, more than 45,000 people were in attendance. The sold-out program was simultaneously broadcasted to over 100 U.S.

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military bases across the world. The Utah SAR color guard was joined by cadets from the Utah Military Academy's American Revolution Patriot's Club. This club is affiliated with the 4H organization and is sponsored by the Utah SAR.

Freedom's Light is a program providing patriotic education to school children. Throughout the day, youth meet Pilgrims, Founding

September 17th Constitution Day!

This year, in lieu of a banquet, the Utah SAR invited members and associates to consider attending the Constitution Day Committee of Utah program featuring **David Barton.** Held at the Layton Christian Academy Theater in Layton, Utah on Saturday, September 17th, the 1,300 seat facility provided an ideal setting for an inspiring patriotic program. **Compatriot Gary England,** dressed in a Continental Regulars uniform, provided the presentation of our national flag.

The key note speaker, **David Barton,** owns one of the largest private collections of original American Revolution documents in the country. He is considered an authority on the U.S. Constitution and Founding era. Barton provided an outstanding presentation, speaking of the noble character of our Founding Fathers and the truth of America's Godly heritage, as well as the significance and importance of the Constitution.

In addition to Barton, the program featured a theatrical presentation with Liberty Trek actors portraying Founding Fathers: **Farley Anderson*** as *Dr. Benjamin Franklin*, **Mark McConkie*** as *Reverend Peter Muhlenberg*, **Scott Hill** as *James Madison*, **Gary VanDolzer*** as *George Washington*, and **Ricky Hatch** portraying *Forefather Governor William Bradford*, pilgrim of Plymouth Plantation fame. Their combined messages gave emphasis to liberty and liberty's requirements, with Washington sharing excerpts from his farewell address.

Officers of the Utah SAR and Utah DAR were invited to a **David Barton** meet-and-greet and received VIP seating. Utah SAR and DAR members who identified themselves at the door were also provided with VIP seating.

Several authors, patriotic book sellers and DVD vendors had tables in the lobby offering program discounts. Many in attendance commented on the inspiring program and expressed gratitude for being there. One gentleman, with tears in his eyes, shared, "My neighbor actually begged me to come; I didn't want to be bothered. I'm so glad I listened to her and came; it was wonderful, truly wonderful."

You Can Inspire an Eagle Scout!

As the Utah SAR Board works to pursue the reactivation of chapters within our state, you don't have to wait to become involved in an activity sponsored by the National SAR and strongly supported by



our state society. This is the **Eagle Scout Recognition Certificate** program that will be one of the various programs each chapter in the state (once organized) will support. We

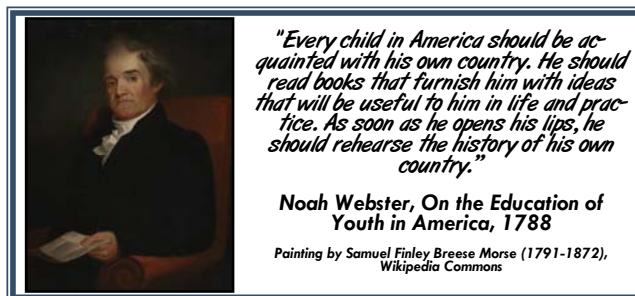
invite you to get a head start and begin developing contacts that will enable you to present these certificates to new Eagle Scouts in the area in which you live. Here are the steps you can take to get started:

Many Scout troops are sponsored by local churches. You can check with the local churches in your area to see which may be sponsoring a Scout troop, and who the Scout masters are. Contact the leaders of the parish, synagogue, congregation, stake, or ward. You might talk to them about recognizing Scouts who achieve the highest rank in Scouting. Depending on the activity within your area, you may need to extend your contacts to cover several troops. Let the Scout masters know that the SAR would like to recognize any Scout who is receiving his Eagle Scout award with a certificate of recognition, which you would present at the Scout's Eagle Court of Honor.

When you learn of a Scout who will be receiving his Eagle Award, you will want to obtain his name and the date of his court of honor. Ask the Scout master if he will grant you about five minutes time during the court of honor to make a presentation on behalf of the SAR. Then send this information to **Larry Florence**, Utah SAR Secretary (utahsociety SAR@msn.com), who will print and send you the certificate AND the short presentation speech that you can deliver at the Eagle Court of Honor. Ask for the Scout master or parent to send you the photo(s) of your presentation, which you will forward on to our state historian, Bill Simpson (simpsonwpc SAR@gmail.com) for our historical records and for our semi-annual newsletter. Presenting the Eagle Scout certificate and briefly speaking of the American Revolution can have a lasting impact on the young man who is being recognized. In addition to the certificates, you'll have a pocket-size booklet of the *Declaration of Independence* and *US Constitution*, and an informational brochure on who we are and what our purpose is in the SAR.

These are available to present to the Eagle Scout with the certificate.

Here is some additional information that may help you find a local scout troop. Utah is divided into three scouting councils: **Utah National Parks Council – South of Salt Lake County and North East Utah** – (<http://www.utahscouts.org/districts>); **Great Salt Lake Council – Salt Lake County to Farmington** (<http://www.utahscouts.org/districts>); and the **Trapper Trails Council – North of Farmington** (<https://www.trappertrails.org/files/2846/District-Boundary-Map>).

Cries of Freedom - Annual Event in Orem

In the Provo area each July is the Freedom Festival where you can see a large display of military vehicles and a Colonial “village”, each having several interactive events. Those attending the 2015 Freedom Festival at Scera Park, in Orem Utah, thrilled as a World War II vintage bomber flew over the park, recreating the candy drop as experienced by the children of the 1948-49 Berlin Soviet blockade. The originator of the candy drop, World War II Veteran, Colonel Gail Halvorsen was on hand to meet and mingle with the crowd. A Naturalization Ceremony was held that day with the swearing in of real immigrants. Col. Halvorsen provided remarks, telling personal experiences in fighting for freedom.

As part of the 2016 Freedom Festival, the Cries of Freedom returned, with Bluegrass musical groups playing their tunes. Cloggers America and “Cries of Freedom The Musical” performed to the delight of those in attendance.

The free musical—shown three times each day—through song and dance, told the story of freedom-seeking people from the late 1400’s to the present day. The audience learned of the pilgrims of the 1600’s and the American colonists of the 1700’s. The show depicted the great moment when we became a nation, as well as many other significant and important events in history. Performers

United States Armed Forces.

Many kids, especially elementary-aged children, are learning very little about our country’s history in school.”



Utah Patriot Camp is a way to teach kids about the founding of our country in a day camp setting. Patriot Camp involves everyone—kids (1st through 6th grade), parents, and the community—“coming together for the common goal of educating ourselves and our children about



Held at Fort Buenaventura, Ogden, Utah, Liberty Trek is a Friday night, partial-day Saturday program for those who want to learn about our great American Heritage of liberty—what liberty is and why liberty matters, and what is necessary to maintain and



preserve liberty. Those who attend can discover the significance of liberty and freedom when they visit a Continental Army encampment, meet Revolutionary War soldiers, see and hear the roar of a cannon, view original patriotic themed inspired paintings,

hear from outstanding speakers, enjoy many interactive activities, celebrate our nation's heritage with music, and participate in the Saturday Liberty Trek. This is a program consisting of five events reenacted by several prominent Founding Fathers and Mothers



including George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, James Madison and their wives. Scouts can earn partial requirements for five merit badges! Liberty Trek began in 2014 and has had nearly 3,000 people attend.

President's Message

Fellow compatriots and associates of the Utah SAR, I hope you found this Fall issue of the Utah Patriot of interest. We thought you might enjoy learning about the several patriotic educational programs that are available here in the Beehive State. Most of them are held annually and are either free or ask a small donation. I have personally attended each of them and find their curriculum to be in harmony with the stated mission and objectives of the Sons of the American Revolution. Most of these programs have come about in an effort to compensate for the inadequate teaching of the American Revolution, and of the Constitution, in Utah's public school system.



If you follow news sources on the internet, you are probably aware of periodic surveys and studies that evaluate to what extent America's youth are knowledgeable concerning the principles of liberty and freedom or even the most fundamental historical facts pertaining to our nation's founding.

In a September 17, 2015 article published by the Atlantic Magazine entitled, "Why Civics Is About More Than Citizenship", the author Alia Wong reported, "Even though all 50 states and the District of Columbia technically require some civic education, advocates say many districts don't take those policies very seriously, and few states actually hold schools accountable for students' civics' outcomes."

The article concludes that "the country's public schools are failing to fulfill one of their core founding missions: to foster and maintain a thriving democracy."

Even this statement should be cause for concern as we consider Dr. Benjamin Franklin's reply to the woman who approached him after the Constitutional Convention of 1787 and asked, "What have you given us?" "A Republic, if you can keep it." A reading of the Federalists Papers indicates democracies are not successful. The Founding Fathers great experiment was to give us not a democracy, but rather a Constitutional Republic. Many of the educational programs highlighted in this issue of the Utah Patriot make this distinction in their offerings, relying on the writings of the Founding Fathers to convey the truth America was established to be a thriving republic.

Is there a need for such patriotic educational programs? Perhaps you are aware of news stories telling of Americans who are at odds with basic unalienable rights such as those outlined in the Constitution's first amendment. We live in a time when there are broader and more concerted attacks on religious freedom, attacks on freedom of speech, attacks on freedom to assemble, the right to privacy within our homes, or the right to defend and protect our

lives and the lives of our loved ones. Each of these has detractors--factions who declare we have no unalienable rights, but rather, as Americans we have privileges bestowed by government, and many of government's privileges are no longer relevant to our time.

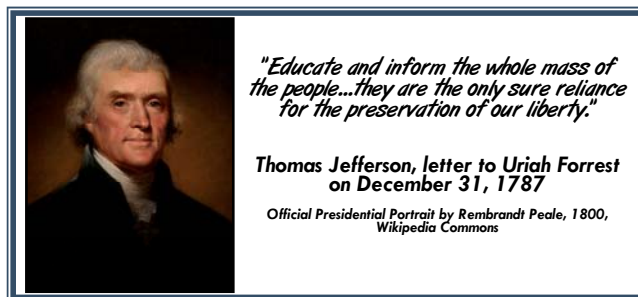
Do our youth understand that the Founding Fathers wanted us to be a free people? Do they understand freedoms' requirements? Do they know what liberty is and why liberty matters? Do they comprehend the significance of self-government, the importance of being self-reliant? The essentials of religion and morality to maintaining a Constitutional Republic? The meaning of virtue and its importance to life? Can they tell you why Revolutionary War patriots wrote on their flags, their shirts, even some carving on the stocks of their flintlocks, "Liberty or Death!" Why would they do this? What did liberty mean to them? What should it mean to us?

The Founding Fathers understood that the more educated a person is in understanding Constitutional Republicanism and the exceptional American principles that established this country, the more value a person would place in preserving and defending the very rare and precious God given unalienable right of liberty and freedom which is ours to have—if we will keep it.

Whether as a refresher, or to learn anew, each of us should avail ourselves of the wisdom handed down by our Founding Fathers, share it with our families, and strive to involve the youth of our communities in preserving the future of our liberties.
